The upcoming (March 10-25) W8S DXpedition team heading to Swains have announced the following pilot stations: Low bands (160 & 80 meters) world wide – PA3FQA, Dick; South America – HK3W, Siso; North America – N1DG, Don; United Kingdom – G3WGV, John; and handling Africa, Asia and Europe will be DL7JAN, Jan. “More info on procedures and communication” are expected soon.

4W - Timor-Leste

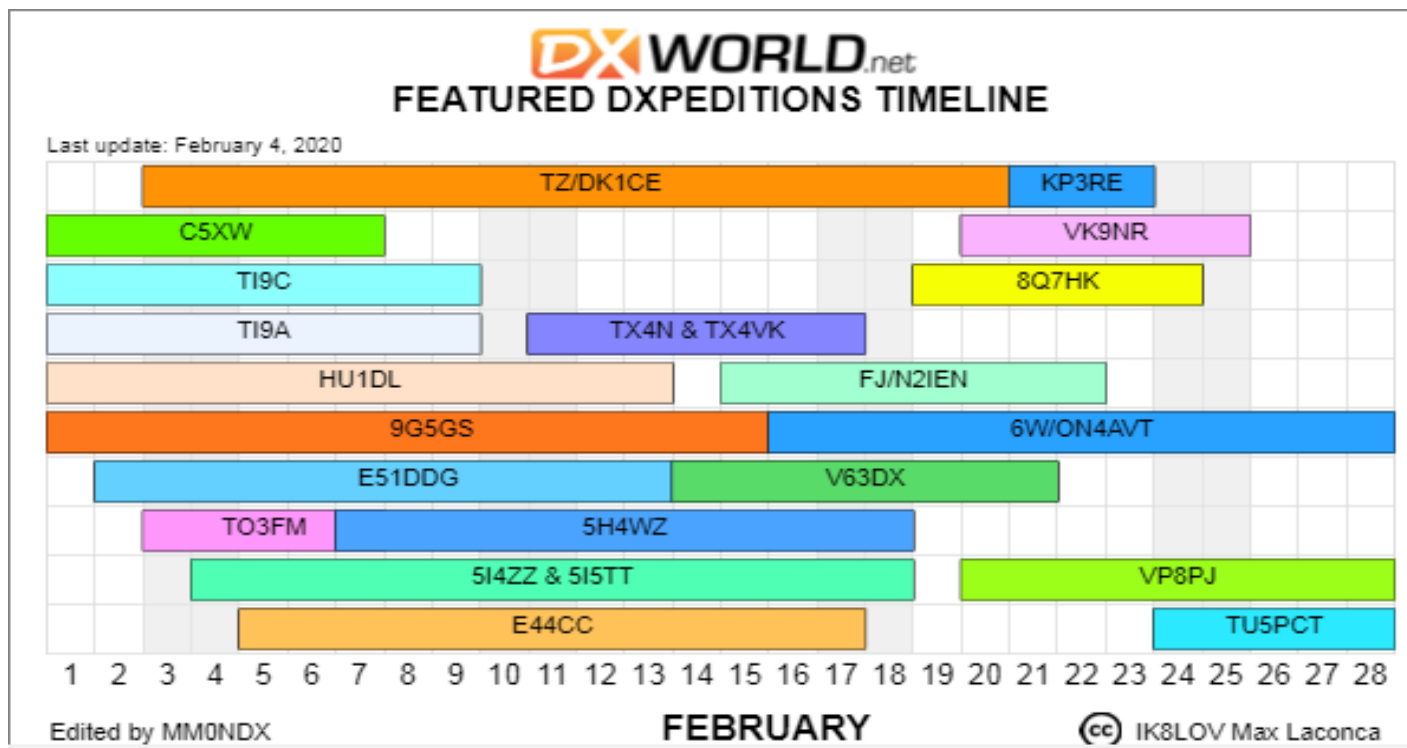
The Lagunaria DX Group is planning a large scale DXpedition to Timor-Leste (4W) in October / November 2020.

Working DXCC on Vacation – Part One

For those of us who pursue the “DX hobby” (some might call it an “affliction”!) within the larger hobby of Amateur radio, many of us wait months...if not years...for that last bit of rare DX we need to add to our totals to (finally!) appear on our bands. This also means that, for many of us, our hobby takes a back seat to other pursuits while we wait...and wait...for that “All Time New One” (ATNO) to show up in our logs.

In the meantime, our equipment and antennas often sit quietly while they’re not being used. And although various organizations (ARRL and CQ Magazine) have tried to add some other DX challenges for us to pursue while we all wait for those rare ones to show up, in recent years, I’ve taken a somewhat different approach to filling in those wait times, while keeping my on-air skills sharp for when that ATNO finally does appear on the bands.

During a vacation to the barrier islands of South Carolina (yes, I freely admit we are among those who call ourselves "Canadian Snowbirds" who head south for the Winter!) I wondered what it would be like to also see how many countries I could contact using a modest station from our rental vacation home there. That quest might also include an attempt to contact over 100 countries thereby qualifying that activity for the American Radio Relay League's (ARRL) coveted DX Century Club award (DXCC)...not to officially apply for a new award...but to generate a bit of a thrill to work a “new one” from a new place .

Our Travel and Rental Approach

Now that we are fully retired, my XYL Kate (KB1OGF/VA3OGF) and I have learned that we really enjoy renting other people's homes or cottages in faraway places for an extended stay...."extended" meaning at least one or two weeks and sometimes upwards of a month or two. We've found this approach usually saves us a whole lot of money over staying in hotels for comparable periods of time, and also allows us, in many ways, to enjoy all the comforts of home while we're on vacation in a new area.

What’s more, as most of these rental properties include a full kitchen, buying groceries at a local supermarket and preparing most vacation meals in-house, also saves us lots of money (not to mention far healthier eating!) for the family rather than dining out all the time.

The Right Rental QTH

Since 2004, our vacation rentals have all been made via the Internet. Together, Kate and I usually select an area where we would like to vacation. Then Kate does a wide Internet search to look for rental properties that not only suit her fancy, but that also include photos of the place. Once she narrows the search down to two or three rentals, I then do a quick look at the photos to make sure that there are sufficient trees close to the property(s) in question to hang my antennas from (more on this later). As we both like to surf the Internet (and I also use it for DX spotting) a broadband Internet connection (preferably wireless) is also one of the "must haves" on the list.

Working DXCC on Vacation (cont'd)

Over the years we've had great success securing vacation rental properties this way. And while we have successfully dealt directly with owners on occasion, we've felt most comfortable working our rentals through a local agent in the vacation area. So far, after leasing some 16 rentals, we've yet to get "burned".

However, it's important to remember that renting vacation property sight unseen is always a case of "buyer beware". This is also spelled "do your homework". Look especially at online comments posted by previous renters about both the property in question and/or the reputation of the owner or rental agent(s). If the comments aren't glowing, there's a good chance the attractiveness of the place itself (or the owner) might be questionable.

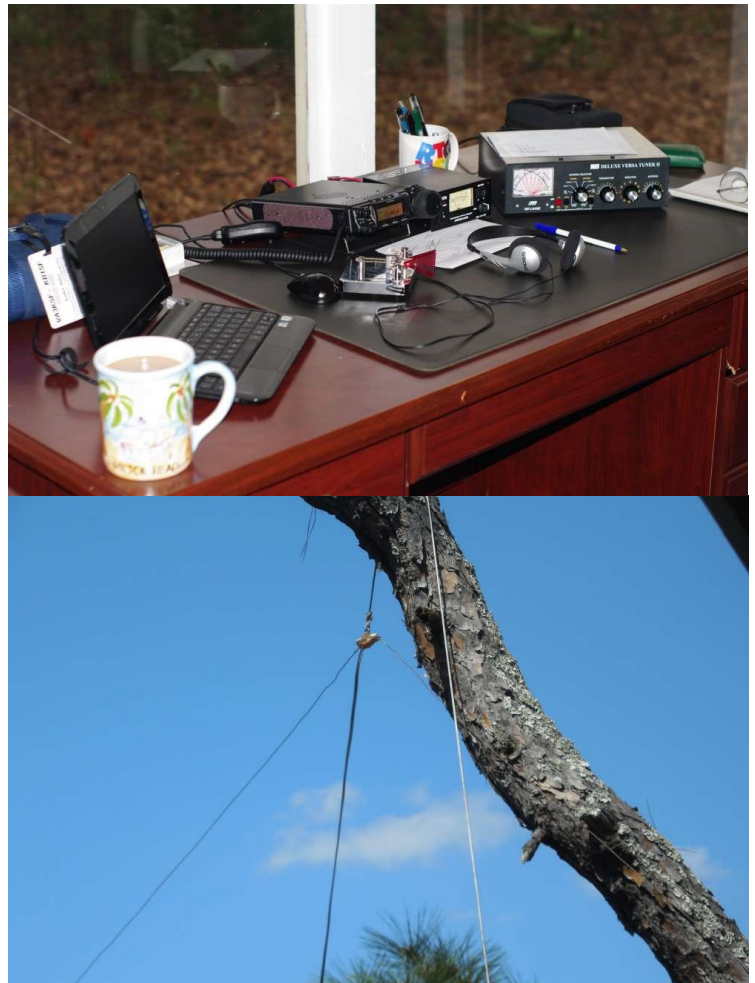
The Station

My usual portable amateur radio station harks back to the days of when I first started in amateur radio. At that time, my station included a transceiver (or transmitter/receiver combination) of at least 100 watts and a well tuned, all-band dipole or vertical.

For travel, the transceiver, tuner, power supply and antenna must take up a relatively small amount of space...preferably all of it fitting in one or two small suitcases or other carrying case. For our latest vacations, my family and I usually drive our Honda van to our "home in the sun", so I've had a bit more room to take things along than if we were getting on an airplane.

Fortunately (and thanks to the continuing march of miniaturized technology), today's amateur radio equipment has been downsized significantly since I first started in the hobby back in the mid-1970s. Back then (and all too often) one needed a whole rack (or room) full of tube-type equipment with heavy (often floor mounted) power supplies, along with separate radios for each band...HF, VHF and/or UHF. What's more, the idea of a "portable" or "mobile" station back then included (as a minimum) a large bulky box (my first mobile station was a Heathkit HW-101 and power inverter sitting on the folded down back seat of my Ford Pinto wagon!) all of which often weighed more than the operator.

Thankfully, those days are now long gone. My portable station these days consists of a small, Yaesu FT-857D, a tiny switching power supply, an MFJ Model 949E tuner, plus a keyer paddle and microphone. On one our later vacations, I added a RigBlaster Plug n' Play modem interface to my laptop computer (http://www.westmountainradio.com/product_info.php?products_id=pngp) that has also allowed me

full HF coverage from 80 Meters to 6 Meters, with the added bonus (tossed in for good measure) of VHF and UHF with the use of a "magnet mount" mobile antenna.

And while I have used portable vertical antennas at some of these vacation rentals, over the years I've found that the G5RV and 30 Meter dipole combination (both set up in an inverted "V" arrangement) seems to be the easiest set of antennas to transport and erect and also work the best for me on the air. This is why it is very important that I work closely with my XYL when we first choose the rental property. Trees (the higher the better and in the clear) at the place are a "must".

Looking Ahead

In the second installment of this feature in the Long Path, I'll outline what I take along on our vacations in an attempt to work DXCC from our rental home along with tips on where, in the rental home, to best locate the station. See you then!
